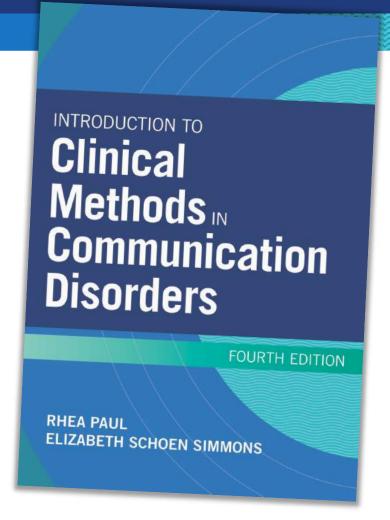

Case Example 1

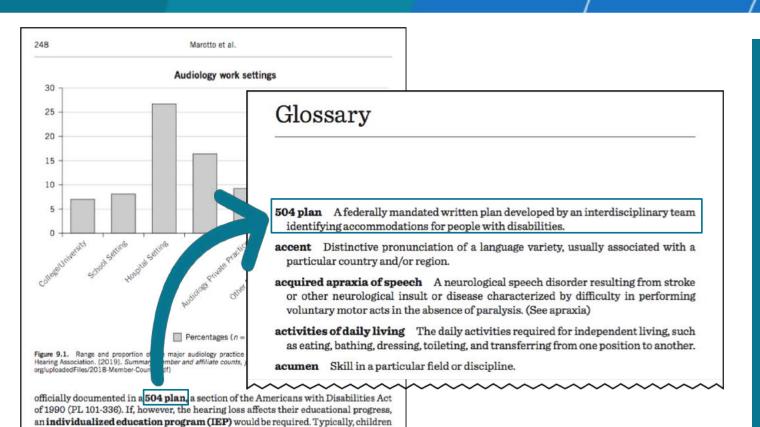
Dora is a 10-year-old, third-grade student with autism, who is placed in an alternative curriculum special education classroom. Dora presents with significant delays in the area of social pragmatic communication, which has a negative impact on her ability to interact with adults and peers in the educational setting. Her specific speech-language objectives address perspective taking, problem solving for everyday school situations, and conversational skills. Dora also presents with below-average skills in the areas of reading, writing, and math. In addition, she is on a behavioral plan to address the use of appropriate behaviors throughout the school day and works with social work services to address peer interaction skills.

Based on this information, what would you recommend for Dora's service delivery plan, and why? Remember to incorporate your decisions about aspects of service delivery, such as which service providers will be involved, the service delivery model(s) used, dosage, functional impact, and progress monitoring.

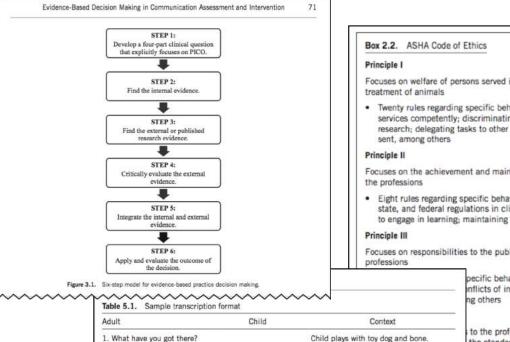

CONCLUSION

This chapter introduced concepts related to EBP in speech-language intervention. In addition, guidelines for what clinicians can do to begin their EBP initiatives have been recommended. This presentation should lead readers to three broad conclusions:

- EBP principles do not limit SLPs to the use of clinical practices shown by the
 external evidence to be efficacious. Decisions based on understanding both theory and research, as well as attention to available internal evidence, are likely to
 maximize benefit to the clients and families served.
- EBP principles do require SLPs to critically examine their own practices to determine what types and what level of evidence supports current treatments. Recognizing situations in which current practices are not supported by strong evidence is as important as identifying practices that are.
- 3. EBP principles do require SLPs to be skeptical about the use of all intervention practices. EBP clinicians monitor the outcomes of their interventions, actively seek evidence in the literature that is relevant to their clinical questions, and work with members of the research community to design studies that address their most important questions. Knowledge of the literature relevant to clinical decisions puts clinicians in the best position to make and defend their decisions, to evaluate the outcomes of those decisions, and to deal effectively with stakeholders who have a vested interest in ensuring that SLPs are accountable for what they do.

Each chapter closes with a final section that summarizes its key elements and provides readers with an abstract of the covered material.

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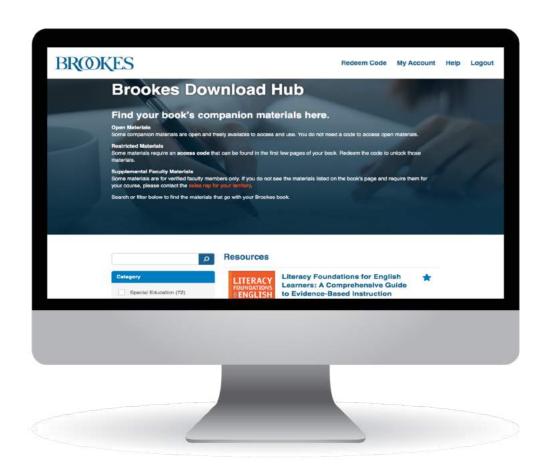
